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00007 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Hearing none the agenda is approved. Ms. McCammon, who will be taking us through the 3 package? MS. McCAMMON: Mr. Chairman, a negotiating team 5 made up of the State of Alaska is the lead -- we're having some 6 feed back on here, Joe, and I'm not sure if it's from your 7 recorder. 8 COURT REPORTER: It's not mine. MS. McCAMMON: Okay. That was led by the State 9 10 of Alaska together with Fish and Wildlife Service representing 11 the Federal side, have been negotiating with Afognak Joint 12 Venture for more than three years now, most intensively since 13 last summer. There have been detailed, and as I said, intense 14 negotiations since we actually went an looked at a number of 15 the parcels under consideration. The negotiating team reached agreement with Afognak 17 Joint Venture last Friday, we have a proposal that we would

18 like to present to the Trustee Council for your consideration. 19 This proposal totals approximately 41,750 acres on northern 20 Afognak Island for a net present value price of \$70,500,000. 21 MR. WOLFE: How many acres was that?

MS. McCAMMON: Forty-one thousand, seven 22 23 hundred and fifty acres, give or take.

MR. WOLFE: Okay. That's in fee. Everything 25 is in fee. I see.

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MS. McCAMMON: Yes, there are approximately 300 2 acres or so of timber rights only on Delphin and Discoverer 3 Islands. Those lands are already held in fee with in the 4 Maritime Refuge, but this package also includes timber rights 5 there.

MR. WOLFE: Okay.

MS. McCAMMON: And what I'd like to do now is 8 to have Alex Swiderski go through the package, in detail, and 9 describe what the proposal is.

10 MR. SWIDERSKI: Mr. Chairman, this is Alex 11 Swiderski. What I'm going to do is walk through the package, 12 essentially subparcel by parcel. The first parcel AJV01a, the 13 proposal is that -- is for an acquisition for approximately 14 19,071 acres which is the large majority, all but about 500 15 acres of AJV01a as it was originally configured by the Council 16 back in 1994, and by the way, I think negotiations actually 17 started 1993, so I think we're closing in on five years of 18 working at this.

19 The only part of Parcel 01a that's not in the proposal 20 is the very southeastern corner of it, constituting about 500 21 to 700 acres that is west of Waterfall Creek. Parcel 01a would 22 include the three islands in Bluefox Bay, Hodd, Teck and Bear 23 Island containing about 386 acres. In addition there is a weir 24 site on Waterfall Creek and the package -- most of the weir 25 site is in the portion that would be acquired in fee.

package would also provide for an easement for use of the land on the other side, so that weir can be attached to the bank, et cetera.

Parcel AJV01b was divided as shown on the map. 5 acquisition would be for the western portion of the parcel, including approximately 2,800 acres. This land is adjacent to the Kodiak National Wildlife Refuge.

Parcel 03a is essentially the configuration that the 9 biologists from Fish and Game, the Fish and Wildlife Service 10 and the Forest Service put together last fall. There were some 11 very minor tweaks to that, made after discussions with AJV, it 12 provides for approximately 7,900 acres to be acquired in fee, 13 5,680 of those acres would be acquired at the time of closing. 14 Approximately 2,200 acres would be acquired following 15 completion of timber harvest on them, but not longer than 15 16 years.

In addition, AJV has agreed to add a 200 foot buffer 18 along the western shores of Laura and Pauls Lake, this was an 19 important addition from the restoration perspective that we 20 were able to secure on essentially the last day of negotiating 21 with them. That buffer would be -- permit in it up to two 22 lodges and cabins and related facilities and limited road 23 access to the cabins.

24 In addition, there's a provision that if a lesser 25 buffer suffices at any point around the lodge to provide the

25

necessary wildlife corridor and protection of the lake that
Fish and Game and the Fish and Wildlife Service would have the
authority to reduce the size of the buffer. I think the
thought is, in effect, that if a lodge were placed on a point
it may not require more than 200 feet going back from the point
to provide adequate protection. Let see, in addition, in
Parcel 03a the weir site at the mouth of Pauls Creek would be
protected by -- actually an easement for operation of the weir
site would be granted to the State of Alaska.

Parcel AJV07 is the same parcel that was originally

Parcel AJV07 is the same parcel that was originally 11 appraised by the Council, it's 256,000 acres and Parcel 08 22 contains 8,742 acres, that parcel has been slightly 23 reconfigured to add some land to the western portion of it and 24 another half section. That parcel does not have commercial 25 timber on it.

In addition, the two islands, Delphin and Discoverer 17 Islands in Perenosa Bay, the surface estates are already owned 18 by the United States, the timber rights are owned by AJV and 19 the timber rights would be acquired as part of this package. 20 So in addition to acquiring something less than fee on Delphin 21 and Discoverer, the 200 buffer easement around Laura and Pauls 22 Lake would be less than a fee acquisition. And that's for a 23 total of approximately 41,750 acres.

23 We've seen some important points over the years where you've
24 had to work on difficult issues, such as dividing up timbered
25 areas so you can retain the best habitat values in those areas
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15 16

and still be able to work some operations through the timber people. And we've been pretty impressed with the work that the Alaska Department of Fish and Game and Department of Interior staff that have been put in on that -- on those particular issues which at some point have drawn concern that very important habitat areas would be lost in this process and dropped off the table. Field staff has been able to work through some very difficult situations and bring considerably valuable property back on the table through their efforts. On behalf of the campaign I just wanted to say that we are certainly grateful for the staff work that's gone into these issues.

And on behalf of the National Audubon Society and its 17 550,000 members, and specifically our Anchorage and Kodiak 18 Chapters, I would like to congratulate the Trustee Council, 19 your staff and Afognak Joint Venture for the successful 20 conclusion of the recent lands purchase agreement reached 21 between the Council and AJV on northern Afognak Island. 22 is a great achievement for conservation and the restoration of

The four major blocks of land on northern Afognak

25 Island, which includes lands along Shuyak Strait, Laura and

23 the Trustee Council.

Pauls Lakes, East Tonki Bay and West Tonki Bay encompass valuable marine shoreline habitat as well as old growth forest lands which provide important habitat for marbled murrelets, brown bear, bald eagles, black tail deer, elk, anadromous salmon and a variety of other wildlife. The long term habitat protection resulting from this action will enhance restoration efforts and will leave a legacy for future generations to enjoy.

The Audubon Society is very pleased with what has been accomplished on northern Afognak Island and congratulates all the participants on crafting a successful agreement for which we can all be proud.

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Thank you, Mr. Schoen. Just to make sure the record is clear on this. There's no agreement quite yet, there is a proposal that negotiators have agreed to 17 take to each of the bodies. Of course, the Council will be 18 considering today, I guess my understanding that AJV will be 19 having a meeting at a later date to also look at it.

20 Are there questions or comments from Council members 21 for Mr. Schoen?

CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, thank you very much and we appreciate your help in all this also. Grant Baker, 25 Mr. Baker.

MR. BAKER: Thank you. My name is Grant Baker and I'm a commercial fisherman in Prince William Sound. I have a salmon setnet in Eshamy Bay which is about 50 miles south of Whittier. I bought my permit in 1988 from someone who had fished the site for about the previous 40 years or so, since the late '40s and early '50s. And he had a fish camp set up and a cabin and I set up my fish camp at the same site and I built a cabin there. And I had a contract with the Chenega Corporation to use the cabin and site since it was their land. And last summer that land was purchased by the Trustee Council and prior to the sale I had been assured by the State that there wasn't any problem of my usage of that area and also for the cabin.

I talked to Chuck Totemoff, the President of the
Chenega Corporation and he said he had notified everyone -- or
the at least had notified the proper people that I was out there
and my usage out there. And he said that he had thought that
they were going to honor my usage at the fish camp. Also I
talked to John Harmening, I believe he with the -- he was the
Forest Service negotiator, I believe, and he said he didn't see
any problem with continuing to use the fish camp and cabin as
In fact, he said that it wouldn't make sense to tear it
down or shut it down because the purpose of the Trustee Council
purchases were to protect and preserve the preexisting uses,
which it was, he said.

Unfortunately after the sale last summer that didn't 2 happen. The State doesn't have a mechanism in place for 3 issuing leases or even title those lands that were transferred. 4 And so for the last year essentially nothing has happened as 5 far as issuing of a lease, they don't know what to do and 6 they're also saying that they'll probably very likely tear down 7 the cabin, which would destroy the fish camp because that's based on that cabin for protection and for storage and for use 9 during the fish camp season with my family.

10 And so what I would ask the Council -- well, also what 11 the State is doing is they say once they get a process in place 12 it will -- they'll send out some kind of a permitting paper to 13 be reviewed and after the review process, which they expect to 14 be very lengthy, but they're not sure when it will start. 15 if there's any opposition, you know, to what they wrote in the 16 permit or about the reviews that I can then go through the 17 appeal process through the administrative appeal process, like, 18 the different levels and, I guess, eventually end up court, 19 which I think most of you know, that process is pretty lengthy, 20 expensive and would essentially put me out of business that 21 way, too.

22 So what I would ask the Council the do right now, for 23 these land purchases that are happening on Afognak, is that to 24 make sure if there are preexisting uses that they're protected 25 because it wasn't the intent of the Council to have this happen

00021 1 to me, but it is happening and I wouldn't wish it on anyone 2 else. So if there -- I would ask the Council to make sure that 3 preexisting uses on the lands that they're going to purchase 4 are protected. And I also ask the Council to help me in my 5 situation to basically protect and preserve my usage of my fish 6 camp. 7 And that's it. Thank you very much. 8 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, thank you. Are there 9 questions for Mr. Baker or comments from Council members? 10 (No audible responses) 11 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay. Alaska Rain Forest Campaign again. And I'd like to say I was
caught short because I didn't exactly have the final version in
front of me of the layout on the buyout and all the components
that were important to us in this process has held together.
We're looking at some pretty extraordinary areas, coastal
habitat for marbled murrelets. I've heard mentioned that the
site along the coastline of Pauls and Laura -- the Pauls and
Laura parcel, AJV03, is the singular top site in the spill zone
and I've heard further comment that it could be one of the top
sites in North America, so it's really satisfying to see this
kind of quality come into a project area like this, an
acquisition.

As I mentioned before, the biologists have done some good work on this area and has put a lot of work in holding together recreational habitat values, such as for deer and elk in wintering areas and, all and all, the way that this parcel configuration enhances the part that is already in place, this is really an impressive layout that the people have put together, so on behalf of the Alaska Rain Forest Campaign and all its member groups, we want to thank you for the work, again, that you've put in this. And we recommend that you

But I think in addition to the comments that you 21 heard on the record today, there is a tremendous amount of 22 public support throughout the state, in the Kodiak Region, in 23 the spill area for this acquisition. 24 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, thank you. 25 brings to the last item on the agenda which is a tentative

action item on the AJV protection package, is..... MS. D. WILLIAMS: Mr. Chairman, I move to 3 approve the resolution. 4 MR. RUE: Second. 5 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: There's been a motion to 6 approve the resolution as drafted, which for the record was 7 made by Ms. William and seconded by Mr. Rue. Is there any 8 comments or discussion on the motion? MR. RUE: Yeah, this is Frank in Juneau. 9 10 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Mr. Rue. 11 MR. RUE: Yeah, I guess I would encourage us 12 all to approve this, I think it's been a tremendously important 13 area for many of the species injured by the spill. I think 14 it's got the highest rating of any of the areas that we've 15 looked at previously. I think there's been a tremendous amount 16 of work that gone into crafting a very excellent package and I 17 would encourage us to approve this resolution. CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Thank you, Commissioner Rue. 18 19 Are there other Council members that would like to make a 20 comment? 21 (No audible responses) CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, I would like to note 22 23 that I concur with Commissioner Rue's comments. I've been 24 involved in this process and watching this negotiation for four

25 or five years, it has been a struggle, but I have been

1 extremely impressed by the ability of the Council negotiators, the AJV negotiators and some of the members of the public that 3 have sort of helped us to formulate the package. We have run 4 up against road blocks where there were, as I recall at times, 5 places that different parties didn't want to go, but people 6 have sat down and worked out, sometimes on acre by acre basis, 7 a reasonable compromise that would benefit all of the parties. I am convinced after reviewing this and listening to the 9 testimony and reading those letters that Molly has mentioned 10 that this is in the public interest, that it is a good price 11 for the Council, that it is a fair price for the sellers and 12 that it is a deal that we should approve. 13 If there is no other comment then.... 14 MS. D. WILLIAMS: Mr. Chairman, I have..... 15 CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Ms. Williams. 16 MS. D. WILLIAMS: I have general comments and 17 then just a couple specific comments. I also want to thank AJV for AJV's 21 patience and persistence and ultimately willingness to enter 22 into what I think is one of our most important land 23 acquisitions.

I believe, in monitoring the negotiations closely, that 25 this was the very best price that the Trustee Council could

pay, the lowest price that the Trustee Council could pay. I, like you, Mr. Chairman, believe it is a very fair price, both 3 for the Trustee Council and for AJV. I think that the 4 restoration benefits from this acquisition are clear and 5 compelling. This acquisition is unequivocally in the public 6 interest. The restoration benefits, as I said, are unambiguous 7 with respect to numerous injured species, particularly the 8 marbled murrelets. And I strongly encourage Trustee Council 9 adoption of this resolution with to minor modifications. 10 And the two minor modifications I would recommend are, 11 first of all, that we specify any and all logging routes, 12 particularly in 3a, so that there is no question about where 13 those are going to go and to the land that is going to be cut. 14 And secondly, that we get clarification, particularly on the 15 cabin issue with respect to the cabins that are to go on --16 near Laura and Pauls Lake on the lake front. I do not believe 17 that the cabin issue is specified clearly enough and there may 18 also be further clarification made of lodges, but with the 19 clarification on the lodge and cabin and with clarification 20 about the logging roads, this is a package that we can all be 21 very proud of and again I want to thank everyone involved and 22 particularly the negotiating team and AJV. CHAIRMAN TILLERY: Okay, thank you, 23 24 Ms. Williams. I think you've just amended your own motion..... 25 MS. D. WILLIAMS: Yes, I've amended my own
