1. Summary of Work Performed:

In quarter 2 the Port Graham Subsistence Access and Habitat Restoration team developed working relationships and roles, outlined a project implementation plan for quarters 2-3, and completed the cooperative agreement process with the US Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) to access project funds.

Once the scope of work was determined and project partners were coordinated, Port Graham Corporation (PGC) and USFWS planned and began implementing initial site assessments including driving, walking, and flying over the entirety of the road system to complete initial site selections for road clearing and year 2 construction. USFWS expedited an engineering and design contract to in order to complete designs and cost estimates on 6 stream crossings and road washouts fall 2022. Completed designs will provide the project team the ability to plan for construction as soon as possible and navigate the inherent timeline complications of working instream within the permit timelines and project logistics in remote Alaska. The following outline and table outlines the plan and progress for Q2 – Q4 in greater detail.

 - ii. Public meetings as needed in Port Graham, Alaska

- 3. Perform temporary road maintenance as needed to support clearing roads.
- 4. Document road condition and related maintenance issues.
- 5. Oversee the design of 5 stream crossings and develop a prioritization plan.

2. Abstract:

In the second quarter, the Port Graham Subsistence Access and Habitat Restoration partnership onboarded partner project managers, completed scope of work outline, began road and site assessments, completed a cooperative agreement contract process with USFWS, assessed road conditions, began planning for 2022 debris and vegetation clearing, and began developing construction site prioritization selections for 2023.

3. Coordination and Collaboration:

In the second quarter, the USFWS, PGC, the Traditional Native Village of Port Graham (NVPG), Chugachmiut continued to work together to achieve project goals and objectives. The USFWS cooperative agreement process documentation helped outline project objectives for Q2-4 and developed roles and responsibilities for project partners. PGC and USFWS project managers meet on a weekly basis to discuss next steps, updates, share data, and set meetings with additional project partners.

The partnership strategically working with the ongoing road construction the Native Village of Port Graham is managing replacing bridges 3 bridges utilizing the Tribal Transportation funds under the Federal Highways Program. The partnership is strategically selecting sites and dividing up project objectives to avoid duplication and promote strategic fiscal and logistical efficiency.

The USFWS utilizes the cooperative agreement process to develop annual budgets, scope of work, and accountability for project objectives and financial management. In Q2, PGC and USFWS worked collaborative to complete the cooperative agreement process on July 15th. In order expedite PGC access to project funds, USFWS approved pre-award costs from May – July 15th to cover coordination and agreement development expenses. Any financial burden acquired from July 15th forward is applied to the approved FY22 obligated funds. At the time of this reporting, the contracts represent obligated funds that have not completed the contracting process. Contracting completion is expected in the early part of Q3 and more detailed financial reporting from all project partners will be available from that point forward.

The "contractual" column represents the cooperative agreement between the USFWS and PGC (\$493,358) and the contract developed for survey and design (\$235,284) for road washouts and stream crossings for Q1-2. Once this cooperative agreement process is completed, USFWS and PGC will have the ability to add more project funds to the contract utilizing the budget approval and amendment process as the scope of work details develop.

The majority of expenditures in Q1-2 have been personnel costs for coordination and travel for site and partner visits by PGC and USFWS personnel. PGC is set to begin clearing vegetation and debris from the road with field work expected to begin in Q3. Sites have been selected for survey and engineer work with surveying and design set to begin in Q3.



6. Actual costs incurred (Contractual):

The Port Graham Corporation (PGC) has incurred the following costs since the inception of the project:

Labor: 40% of labor cost incurred we associated with the pre-contract CLIN (June 1, 2022 – July 31, 2022). This budget of \$24,052.86 was exhausted, with PGC incurring, <u>but not charging</u>, additional costs over this budgeted amount when preparing the FY-22 budget, SOW and various forms required. The remaining 60% of labor reported above was incurred after the July 15, 2022 contract start date.

Travel: This line item is comprised primarily of helicopter time with Aero Tech (Seldovia) on July 28, 2022. There were also two round trip charter flights with Alaska Air Taxi to get crew members and gear to the various sites along the road between Port Graham, Alaska and the Rocky Lake Lodge at mile 23. The purpose of the trip was aerial road assessment (video and still imagery).

Contractual: One of the crew members on the July 28, 2022, road assessment trip was a video specialist from PGDC based in Palmer, Alaska. His labor and per diem are in this line item.

Indirect costs: PGC's approved indirect rate is 10% on all costs excluding equipment rentals. There we no equipment rentals incurred in either June or July of this year.
